The concept systems method guides action plan development, strategic planning, implementation, evaluation and other activities in which group input is valued. Concept mapping takes the ideas of individuals and combines them to form unique visual representations called Concept Maps. Opinions or views can then be compared and contrasted. The process is participative, inductive, structured, simple and intuitive and visual. The resulting framework and images help an organization to understand how its stakeholders view a specific topic from many perspectives. It provides the framework for a well-informed, group-oriented, decision-making process.

Participants will focus on the political and practical considerations for concept mapping, its place in the evaluation of large initiatives, and its usefulness for identifying and engaging communities and populations of diverse values and interests.

Participants will be expected to take part in a concept mapping brainstorming activity, via internet, prior to the workshop.
